2201 Day Break Ridge is an 11,000 square foot mountain home with spectacular views of Beaver Creek Resort and the Bachelor Gulch ski area. The residence is actually two homes in one, with the main house reflecting the "parkitecture" of the local area, and the guest house recalling turn-of-the-century log cabins.

At the main house, a grand entry leads visitors a half-level down to the fun spaces in the home, including the unique wine room, exercise room, sauna, and game room. These spaces are hewn out of the local rock and look into the courtyard formed by the two buildings.

The game room boasts an old-fashioned western bar, entertainment center, and a pool table looking out to a grotto-rock spa. A half-level up from the entry sits the great room, dining room, kitchen, library, and other more formal spaces. Here, log columns are used in conjunction with heavy timber trusses and beams to create unique lodge-like spaces. Full-height windows lend views to Beaver Creek Resort and the Gore Mountain Range, while oversized doors lead to large sandstone patios situated at the top of the spa.

An elevated pedestrian bridge connects the grand main house with the cozier guest house, and overlooks the approaching driveway. This bridge theme is reinforced by the driveway itself, which travels along a stone bridge on the way to the home.

The combination of the two homes, along with the use of log siding, log columns and trusses, battered stone, and cedar shingles, culminates in a grand residence, which seems to have grown through accretion over the years. Construction on 2201 Day Break Ridge was completed in the spring of 1999.
